Overview of MARRC

The Manitoba Association for Resource Recovery Corp. (MARRC) is a non-profit corporation established in 1997 by manufacturers and marketers of lubricating products in Manitoba. Its mandate is to develop, implement and administer a cost-effective, sustainable, user-financed, province-wide stewardship program for used oil, used oil filters and used oil containers.

MARRC was incorporated under The Corporations Act of Manitoba on April 1, 1997. It operates in accordance with a Letter of Approval issued by Manitoba Environment on February 26, 1998 under Section 7 of the "Used Oil, Oil Filters and Containers Stewardship Regulation" of the Waste Reduction and Prevention Act.

Further to earlier approvals of 5 year terms, MARRC received a letter of approval dated September 25, 2013, from the Minister of Conservation extending the Stewardship Plan term for an additional five years to December 15, 2017.

On May 1, 2011 the Corporation was also approved to operate the Used Antifreeze Stewardship Program by the Minister of Conservation. The Used Antifreeze Stewardship Program commenced operation August 1, 2011. The approval from the Minister of Conservation expires December 31, 2016. On October 22, 2015, the Minister approved an extension to the "Condition of Approval". This approval shall now expire on December 15, 2017 (See letter on opposite page).

The Corporation derives revenue principally in the form of Environmental Handling Charges (EHCs) applied to the sale or consumption of selected lubricating and antifreeze products in Manitoba. The Corporation's primary expenses are related to the:

- establishment and operation of a publicly-accessible network of licensed collection facilities for used lubricating and antifreeze products,
- payment of Return Incentives to companies licensed by the province and registered with MARRC to collect used lubricating and antifreeze products and transfer them to approved processors and end-users,
- payment of Processing Incentives to companies licensed by the province and registered with MARRC to recycle used lubricating and antifreeze products, and
- development and distribution of public education materials.

MARRC's affairs are managed by a six-person Board of Directors drawn from the member companies of MARRC and from other stakeholder organizations, including a Director representing the Antifreeze industry.

Thank you for your letter dated September 25, 2015 regarding extension to the approval of the Antifreeze Stewardship Program of the Manitoba Association for Resource Recovery Corp. (MARRC) under *The Waste Reduction and Prevention Act (WRAP Act)*.

I am hereby providing an extension to the "Conditions of Approval" as identified in your Letter of Approval, dated April 14, 2011. All other terms and conditions will remain in force without change. Furthermore, pursuant to Section 7(4) of the *Household Hazardous Material and Prescribed Material Stewardship Regulation*, this approval shall expire on December 15, 2017. In accordance with this extension, please submit a new consolidated plan including used oil, oil filters and containers and antifreeze for your organization on or before August 31, 2017.

Note that any notices to be provided to department officials pursuant to this approval shall be submitted in writing to: Christina McDonald, Chief Operating Officer, Green Manitoba, Manitoba Conservation and Water Stewardship, 160-123 Main Street, Winnipeg MB, R3C 1A5.

As we consult broadly on ways to further reduce waste in Manitoba, we will seek MARRC's advice on how to expand the opportunities for Manitobans to safely dispose of household hazardous wastes including the materials presently being collected by MARRC, particularly in northern and remote communities.

We look forward to our continued discussions and collaboration and I trust that this extension will allow MARRC to plan for further expansion into these communities. Thank you for providing an important environmental service to Manitobans.

Ambassador Program - Partners in Progress!

MARRC participted in over 50 exhibitions, tradeshows and parades this year with almost 13,000 people visiting the MARRC booth to fill out our survey. They received information on recycling used oil and antifreeze products as well as valuable prize giveaways. MARRC also partnered with two other Producer Responsible Organizations (PROs) and distributed their brochures and informational material as well:

Switch the Stat – Responsible for the recycling of used thermostats and mercury switches. Each thermostat has one to four switches, each switch contains 2.5 grams of mercury. Just 1 gram of mercury is enough to contaminate an 8 hectare lake to the point where the fish are inedible for a whole year!

Health Product Stewardship Association (HPSA) – Responsible for recovering medications that are expired or no longer needed and handling of them in a safe and responsible manner before they are disposed of in the grabage or poured down sewers and drains.





Ambassador Program - Brochures Distributed



Northern Remote Communities

MARRC hosted meetings organized through Manitoba Conservation with various Producer Responsible Organization (PRO) representatives to discuss the prospects of assisting communities only accessible by winter road with the recycling of used oil products, derelict cars, tires, batteries, electronics and MMSM products with St. Theresa as the Pilot Project. Further discussions with MARRC lead to the licensing, purchasing, transporting and installation of a used oil burner and storage unit at the Fire Station in St. Theresa Point.



Bursaries awarded for a Twelvth year

Bursaries were awarded to students (2 x \$500 each) qualifying in Environmental Studies at the University of Manitoba, University of Brandon, the University of Winnipeg and Red River Community College.

MARRC Participated with the Northern Association of Community Councils (NACC)

Their 45th Annual tradeshow was held at the CanadInns Polo Park Hotel in Winnipeg on August 18th through the 20th. The NACC represents the interests of 52 northern and remote communities under the jurisdiction of aboriginal leaders and northern affairs. Over 200 delegates from the northern communities federal and provincial affiliates, private sector and non-profit organizations attended.



EcoCentre / Collection Depot network maturing at 85

MARRC's rural EcoCentre network stands at 55 exceeding the minimum network objective established by the province's multi stakeholder Used Oil Management Committee in 1996. The network includes the northern locations of Churchill, St. Theresa Point, The Pas, Flin Flon and Thompson, plus Cranberry Portage, Grand Rapids & Hollow Water. In addition there are 30 other facilities licensed by Manitoba Conservation in place for the collection of used oil and antifreeze products, including 10 locations in Winnipeg (6 of which are Canadian Tire). Frank's Motors was added in the City of Winnipeg while the Winfield Transfer Station in the RM of Rockwood near Stonewall opened their One-Stop Shop Facility as well in 2015.

City of Winnipeg

MARRC is targeting to increase licensed locations in Winnipeg. Great Canadian Oil Change (GCOC) have received approved licenses for 4 sites in Winnipeg along with 4 rural locations. GCOC is currently negotiating a cost effective rate for the EIL Insurance coverage required by Manitoba Conservation. Discussions with the City of Winnipeg for a One-Stop-Shop concept have been finalized. (See page 16 re: Brady Landfill location).

Training and audits promote safety and compliance

MARRC as part of its contractual arrangements with owners/operators of licensed collection facilities, provides initial and recurrent on-site training for management and staff. The training and follow-up audits are designed to promote a safe operation and compliance with each facility's operating license issued by Manitoba Conservation. During 2015, inspections were conducted at all of the licensed EcoCentres and collection depots in the Province.

Strategic Planning Session (Aug 19-21)

SARRC hosted the combined Strategic Planning Session of BCUOMA, AUOMA, MARRC, SOGHU & Ontario Directors and Staff. The session focused on addressing key strategic issues and team building.

Local Initiatives

Several communities in Manitoba held their own localized EcoDay events including:

- Pilot Mound on April 30; over 200 Pilot Mound & Crystal City students viewed a video covering the Louise Integrated Waste Facility's recycling procedures and also received MARRC's wristbands, brochures and bookmarks;
- Dauphin's EcoDay on June 20;
- Steinbach's Oil Recycling Day on June 10

Plastic Container Audit

MARRC commenced in 2013 and concluded in April 2015, detailed checks of container bags. The main purpose was two-fold:

- To eliminate contaminated products
- To determine the amount of antifreeze and windshield washer containers entering into the collection stream.







Collection Activity by Product 2015










Antifreeze Fluid Recovery Review

Antifreeze collection in the Province and indeed throughout Canada has been relatively low while sales of Antifreeze fluid have been stable as confirmed in the EHC numbers. This brings up the question, where is the used product going? MARRC has initiated a study that will involve interviewing Collectors, Processors, Retailers, Big Box Stores, Commercial Accounts, Generators, Do-It-Yourselfers, etc. to determine the reason for the low recovery rates.


MARRC Collection Activity

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Members of Manitoba Association for Resource Recovery Corp.

1 Nature of operations

Manitoba Association for Resource Recovery Corp. (the Corporation) was formed by oil and oil filter first sellers in Manitoba to develop, implement and administer a used lubricating products stewardship program in the province and began operation on January 1, 1997. The Corporation was incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation without share capital under The Corporations Act of Manitoba on April 1, 1997. On February 26, 1998, the Corporation received approval to operate its Used Lubricating Products Stewardship Program from the Minister of Environment, Province of Manitoba. On May 1, 2011, the Corporation was also approved to operate its Antifreeze Stewardship Program by the Minister of Conservation, Province of Manitoba. The Antifreeze Stewardship Program began active operations on August 1, 2011.

On September 25, 2013, the Corporation received approval to continue to operate the Used Lubricating Products Stewardship Program until December 15, 2017. The current Antifreeze Stewardship Program expires December 31, 2016.

As a not-for-profit corporation, no provision for corporate income taxes has been made in these financial statements pursuant to paragraph 149(1)(1) of the Income Tax Act.

2 Basis of presentation

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

3 Summary of significant accounting policies

Fund accounting

The accounts of the Corporation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Fund accounting is a procedure whereby a self-balancing group of accounts is provided for each accounting fund established by the Corporation.

For financial reporting purposes, the accounts have been classified into several funds. The activities carried out by each fund are as follows:

- Used Lubricating Products Stewardship Program reports funds for the operations of the Used Lubricating Products Stewardship program.
- Antifreeze Stewardship Program reports funds for the operations of the Antifreeze Stewardship Program.
- Invested in Capital Assets reports the funds for the purchase and amortization of capital assets used in the operations of the Corporation.

Significant accounting policies are as follows:

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand and cash and cash equivalents held at banking institutions.

Investments

Investments consist of guaranteed investment certificates (GICs) and equity instruments. Investments that are intended to be held or that have maturity dates under a year are deemed to be short-term investments, with all others classified as long-term investments. Realized and unrealized gains and losses are included as investment income in the statement of operations. Purchases and sales are recognized using trade date accounting.

Capital assets

Capital assets are carried at acquisition cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization of office furnishings, equipment and leasehold improvements is calculated on a straight-line basis at an annual rate of 20% based on the estimated useful lives of these assets. One-half of the annual rates are charged in the year of acquisition.

Revenue recognition

The Corporation follows the deferral method of accounting for revenues. Revenue from environmental handling charges is recognized in the year for which suppliers and end-users assess it, as regulated by the Used Oil, Oil Filters and Containers Stewardship Regulation and by the Household Hazardous Material and Prescribed Material Stewardship Regulation of The Waste Reduction and Prevention Act. The one-time membership fees are recorded as revenue when the participating companies join the Corporation.

Dividend and interest income from investments and cash equivalents is recognized when earned and is recorded as investment income in the statement of operations. Other income is recognized when earned.

Return and processing incentives

The return and processing incentives are recognized as an expense in the year to which the claim relates.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with ASNPO requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual amounts could differ from those estimates.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognized at fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost, except for investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market, which are subsequently measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the statement of operations in the year incurred.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash and cash equivalents, GIC investments, environmental handling charges receivable and accrued interest and other receivables.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include return and processing incentives payable and accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Financial assets are tested for impairment at the end of each reporting period when there are indications that the assets may be impaired.

12 Financial instruments

The Corporation manages risk and risk exposures by applying policies approved by the Board of Directors.

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counterparty will fail to perform its obligations. The Corporation is exposed to credit risk through its environmental handling charges receivable. The risk is minimized due to the large registrant base.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk refers to the risk that a financial instrument or cash flows associated with the instrument will fluctuate due to the changes in interest rates. The Corporation's exposure to interest rate risk pertains to interest-bearing, short-term and long-term investments, which are subject to future changes in interest rates.

Other price risk

The Corporation's other price risk is the risk that the fair value of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. The Corporation's exposure to other price risk pertains to its equity investments which are affected by the changes in market prices.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Corporation will encounter difficulty in meeting its financial obligations associated with financial liabilities in full. A range of alternatives is available to the Corporation including cash flow provided by operations, debt or a combination thereof.
